Iwan Azis has been teaching at Cornell University since 1992. He was the Director of Graduate Studies of Regional Science during 2005-2010, is currently (Adj) Professor at the Dyson School of Applied Economics and Management at the same university, and Professor of Economics at the University of Indonesia. He is also active in coordinating several on-line courses. His major research interest is on the link between macro-financial development and social and regional issues. In 2006, he was awarded *"Distinguished Scholar in Regional Science, Financial Economics, and Economic Modeling."* He has done advising and research work for various governments, international organizations and universities. In 2010-2014 he headed a regional integration and cooperation office at an international organization, during which the Governor of Bank of Japan and former President of Asian Development Bank (ADB) wrote in "Reflections from Bank of Japan Governor Haruhiko Kuroda: *"Professor Azis made an enormous contribution to the operation of the Asian Development Bank's Office of Regional Economic Integration.....he is an economist whose analysis of Southeast Asian economies continues to demand our close attention."*

Professor Azis is the author of "Crisis, Complexity and Conflict" from Emerald (2009), the lead author of the widely-read book "Managing Elevated Risk" from Springer (2015), "Mathematical Modeling For Economic Analysis" from UI Press (2018), and "Regional Economics: Fundamental Concepts, Policies, and Institutions" from World Scientific (2020).
