Prof. Iwan Azis has been teaching at Cornell University since 1992. He was the Director of Graduate Studies of Regional Science during 2005-2010, (adj) Professor in the Johnson Graduate School of Management, and is currently at the Dyson School of Applied Economics and Management, and faculty advisor in the “Emerging Markets Program.” Since 2015, he has been active in coordinating a series of on-line courses including for the University of Indonesia.

His major research interest is on the link between macro-financial economics and social and regional issues. In 2006, he was awarded "Distinguished Scholar in Regional Science, Financial Economics, and Economic Modeling." He has done advising and research work for various governments, international organizations and universities. During 2010-2014 he was appointed as the Head of the regional integration and cooperation office at the Asian Development Bank.

Among his recent articles are “Coping With the Dangerous Component of Capital Flows” by Cambridge University Press (2018); “Economics and Culture,” in Bulletin of Monetary Economics and Banking (2019); “Regional Development and Noneconomic Factors,” in the International Encyclopedia of Human Geography, Elsevier (2020); and “Financial Spillover in Emerging Asia: A Tale of Three Crises,” in Asian Economic Papers, MIT Press (2021).

Professor Azis is the author of “Crisis, Complexity and Conflict” from Emerald (2009), the lead author of the widely-read book on financial crisis “Managing Elevated Risk”

from Springer (2015), “Mathematical Modeling For Economic Analysis” from UIP (2018), and “Regional Economics: Fundamental Concepts, Policies, and Institutions” from World Scientific (2020). His forthcoming book is “Dualism and Interplay Of Policy and Institution: MSME and Regional Development” from Springer (2021).
